



Continuing Education Registration Opens

Advertising for Salespeople Available June 4

For those wanting to get an early start meeting their Continuing Education (CE) requirement, enrollment in the first module of the new professional CE program will begin June 4. The next two modules will be released in June and July. Every VSA CE module will include:

- Online readings and self-correcting quizzes
- Extensive links to online resources, such as decisions of the Registrar and the courts
- An optional moderated blog for questions and a discussion of the course content
- An optional review webinar with the Registrar and other experienced VSA staff members
- A printable PDF document of the core materials for reference

Registration and payment for the course can be made through the VSA portal. Just log in to [Online Licensee Services](#) as you would to update your profile or renew online. Or you can register by FAX, mail or in person using the [course registration form](#).

Once you register, you'll receive an email the next business day with a link to the self-study website. For those who took their Salesperson Certification Course in the web-based format, this will seem very familiar. Instructions and details of the optional blog and webinar will be provided once you're there.

You'll be enrolled in a session that will give you at least 30 days in which to complete the module. Completion time for the core material is targeted at 90 minutes for the average reader. Based on your level of interest, including participation in the class blog and the optional review webinar, you may choose to extend this time. The module does not need to be completed in one visit and satisfaction of your CE requirement is based on the completion of three modules, not class marks.
